RUSSO BROS. FOUND GREENER PASTURES

(The long, tedious, and hard working family venture in business began 75 years ago)

The well known Russo family (Carmello, Francis “Buster”, Charley and Tony) began their family journey the hard way while still being youngsters prior to becoming teenagers. They were born to immigrant parents from Italy unable to read or write in their native tongue or even read English. Their father, Carmello, Sr worked in the mines for over 50 years and was known as the “Green Thumb”. Thus, vegetables were grown and the young boys began distributing them by taking turns pulling their wagon each day. However, earlier in life two of the boys even had a shoe-shining business at ages 10 and 12 as they set their chairs on both ends of Iron Street strumming up business. Their original 1938 store in Ishpeming was called “Stop and Shop” selling fruits and vegetables. Two years later, the family moved to Negaunee for greener pastures and the business opened on the west end of Iron Street. The firm closed in 1942 as their store was the only local store to cease business as all four brothers entered the armed forces. At the close of WWII, the business reopened and remained at their original site until 1953. The business moved next to the Pioneer Agency Building (where Pellow Printing is still operating) until the celebration of Negaunee’s 100-year centennial. The business then moved again in 1965 to its new location and the supermarket became the first major construction in the Iron Street business district in 4 decades.

STANDARD OIL CHANGES HANDS MORE THAN OIL!!

(Negaunee’s Oldest Service Station Opened 95 Years Ago)

What do Ron “Jethro” Collins, Kenny Maki, Ben Pascoe, Roger “Smokey” Stott and Jim Thomas have in common? They were some of the owners of the same Standard Oil gas station next to the Fire Hall which had the distinction of being the oldest service station in Negaunee. Henry Lequia was the original proprietor in 1920 when he sold out to Stanley Bath in 1925. Walter Neely became the owner from 1930-1948 under the name of Neely’s Standard. He disposed of the business in 1948 to Ben Pascoe who renamed his business Pascoe’s Standard until selling out to his mechanic Jim Thomas in 1965 who in turn sold it to Ron Collins a year later. Jethro then passed Ron’s Standard on to “Smokey” who then sold it to Kenny Maki who had the business until his retirement. It’s quite possible that I even missed an “oil change”.

HIGHLIGHTS – 50 YEARS AGO

Information taken from Robert Dobson's Iron Herald Notes

1965

April 23, 1965 - Ten entries entered to become Centennial Queen. They were judged on swimsuits, talents, and personality just as in the Miss Michigan contest.

May 7, 1965 - NHS valedictorian was Janice Sivula and salutatorian was Laura Laurila.

May 7, 1965 - St. Paul valedictorian was Peter Valenti and salutatorian was Lois Marta.

May 21, 1965 - First centennial event was a Promenade in centennial costumes down town. It drew the largest crowd to the business district since the U.P. Firemen's tournament in 1960.

May 28, 1965 - Second centennial preview provided the Ishpeming Blue Notes and the promenade by the centennial Queen candidates.

June 11, 1965 - The Diamond Jubilee Scholarship went to Janice Sivula.

June 25, 1965 - Negaunee Post Office was made a First Class office.

July 2, 1965 CENTENNIAL ISSUE

Two oldest Negaunee residents were Sarah (Smith) Augustson and Johanna (Flynn) Scanlon. Both resided on East Peck Street and they were neighbors.

First of three Centennial parades was held as a fraternal parade of all groups and six musical units.

Queen candidates were Nancy Lukkarinen, Diane Collins, Roberta Delongchamp, Sharilyn Gleason, Cheryl Hoiem, Linda Hooper, Betty Jean Johnson, Jill Ruhanen, Charlene Russo and Karen Trehwella.

Negaunee had only one dairy, the Mattson Dairy in Negaunee Township. Pasteurization began in 1949 and vitamins were added in the early 1950's.

July 16, 1965 - Crowd totals for the centennial estimated at over 100,000. The Centennial Queen was Miss Diane Collins. 3,000 attended the Bobby Vinton Teenagers Ball, the Grand Finale Day parade had over 35,000 spectators and it took over two hours to get all the traffic out of town from an estimated 15,000 vehicles.

NEW LOOK ON WEST END OF IRON STREET

Excerpts from "Negaunee Iron Herald" May 8, 1925

Modern Structure on Gauthier Property

The three story frame building on Iron Street that was erected in 1865 by the late Medard Gauthier is to be replaced by a modern business block, the work of dismantling the pioneer structure being well underway. Phileas Bernard⁽¹⁾, who has occupied the present building as a barbershop and residence, will meantime have business quarters in the Brand⁽²⁾ building facing on Jackson Street. Plans call for a large store room, in addition to quarters for Mr. Bernard's barber shop, and there will be office rooms on the second floor. Coupled with the widening of Pioneer Avenue bringing the Gauthier lot into corner prominence, building of the new theatre⁽³⁾ a few doors to the west, will add materiality to the appearance of the east end of Iron Street.

Also a New Bakery

Work has also been started by Joseph A. Torreano, who purchased the property on Jackson Street, immediately west of the McDonald block⁽⁴⁾, in dismantling the building prior to erection of a new tile and brick structure which will house his bakery and afford living quarters. The building which is now being torn down was originally the Montreal House⁽⁵⁾ and stood on the site now occupied by the Negaunee National Bank. It was purchased by the late Matthew Maloney and moved to the lot on Jackson.

- (1) Bernard Building became the Teen Tap and Eugene DeGabriele's Barbershop
- (2) Brand building now known as Hakala Well and Plumbing office
- (3) The new theatre being built was the Vista Theatre now PAAC
- (4) McDonald Opera House is now the Negaunee Elks
- (5) Torreano's Bakery is now Expressions Hair Styling

PARKKONEN'S INVENTION – THE PAINT BRUSH SCRUBBER

He created a prototype and sure enough, it worked. The production model is now available on store shelves and is made of 100 percent recycled, environmentally friendly wood, and is moisture and rot-resistant. It's on sale for \$14.99 and keeps your high quality brushes working better and lasting longer.

March 7, 1915 - Negaunee Star Band organized under leadership of Pietro Zanotti.

September 1915 - Manual Arts Building (western part of Central Grade School) opened for classes. It replaced the original Presbyterian Church site.

REMARKABLE COINCIDENCE ON BASKETBALL COURT

Excerpts taken from "Negaunee Iron Herald" March 8, 1963

History repeated itself on Saturday night at Northern Michigan College Field House as the St. Paul Emeralds defeated the Champion Indians for the 1963 District Class D basketball title 59-57 in overtime. It was back in 1938 that the Catholics playing their first season of basketball also defeated Champion for a district championship. By an odd coincidence, that 1938 game was a nip and tuck affair with the winning bucket coming in the closing seconds of play on a shot by our honorary State Representative, Dominic Jacobetti. Twenty-five years, his son Dominic ("Dukey") provided the same heroics with the winning basket in overtime. Remember -- "Ripley's, believe it or not".

HOW DID NEGAUNEE NAME ITS STREETS?

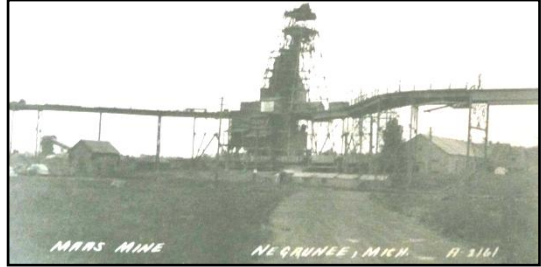
(The following illustration is a possible reason for this street name)

GEORGE J MAAS (30JUN1861-2DEC1915)

MAAS ST

Maas Street is located between US-41 and Croix Street and is just north of Miners Park. Maas was a familiar name to early Negaunee residents so it isn't surprising that there is a street named for him. The Maas name is associated with the Maas Mine opened in 1902 and located in the area southeast of Cherry Street and across from the Negaunee city warehouse.

George Maas initiated the explorations on the Maas Mine property in 1891. The drilling was deep and expensive and it was in 1901 when enough ore was satisfied to justify and develop the mine. Ground was broken on February 3, 1902 as George Maas raised the first shovel of dirt and the Maas Mine was christened. George Maas was also the President of the First National Bank in 1905. One of Negaunee's finest homes was built on East Main Street and owned by the Maas family. It was torn down in the 50's when many homes were being moved due to mining.
